

INTRODUCTION

I hope this study guide will give you some ideas on how psychology can be used in church work. Psychology can be helpful in better understanding churches and church-related activities, as well as offering constructive alternatives in the way things can be done in ministry.

Let me caution you against making psychology the heart of your life. The only sure foundation is Jesus Christ, and only through prayer and the careful study of the Bible can the church be built. However, I hope you will see that psychology can help us build the church more effectively. Only through the work of the Holy Spirit can we accomplish the task of building the Kingdom, but God can use what psychologists discover for His purposes.

These ideas are, by no means, the last word on these topics. You should feel free to experiment with some of the ideas in this book. Psychologists are learning more every day about people, and thus this book will always be incomplete. I encourage you to read this with a good, current textbook in general psychology, and you may find yourself doing some of the same adapting and extending of ideas to the church similar to what I have done in this booklet.
